October is National Physical Therapy month. As we age, we often lose flexibility, strength, and balance. Because physical therapists receive specialized education in a variety of sciences (kinesiology [human movement], physics) and know how to manage all four of the body's major systems (human anatomy, musculoskeletal, neuromuscular, cardiovascular/pulmonary, and integumentary [skin]), they can help us address challenges to restore and maximize mobility, avoid the need for surgery and the long-term use of prescription medications and their side effects, help us achieve and maintain fitness goals, and minimize our risk of injury.

Physical therapists treat conditions that limit your ability to move and function in daily life. Many physical therapists specialize in treating specific areas of the body, such as the back, neck, knee, hand, or shoulder, or they may concentrate their practice in other specialties, such as stroke rehabilitation, orthopedics, sports, geriatrics, pediatrics, cardiopulmonary, neurology, women's health, and clinical electrophysiology.

A physical therapist can help you achieve long-term results for many conditions that limit your ability to move, such as diabetes, recovering from a stroke, a fall, or a sports injury. A physical therapist is a licensed health care professional who will work closely with you and your physician to examine, evaluate your condition, and develop a personalized plan of care.

Although you have the freedom to choose your physical therapist, keep in mind that your insurance policy may require a visit to the primary care physician first to get a physician's referral, or may limit your access to preferred providers only. Otherwise it might be an out-of-pocket expense. Always insist that your physical therapy be provided by a licensed physical therapist, as they are bound by the Association's Code of Ethics to provide competent and compassionate care.

To get the most out of your initial first visit, be prepared with note pad in hand. Consider taking a family member or trusted friend with you to help you remember details. Wear comfortable clothing. If you have problems with hearing or vision, be honest and explain that to the physical therapist so that they can assist you by speaking slowly, louder and provide you with charts or pictures. Write down your description of the condition/injury/environmental factors and specific information about your symptoms, medical history, medications, bring any and all diagnostic results pertaining to the current condition, a list of physicians that

are treating or have treated the current condition, and list of questions regarding treatment, evaluation of progress and medical services costs and payment, Medicare limits and caps for the calendar year. Expect a detailed evaluation and examination with lots of questions. All in all, physical therapists can be valuable partners and their overall goal is to help you maintain an active lifestyle, restore, improve and/or achieve your mobility/motion and reduce your pain.



GLOBAL MISSIONS

The Global Missions Committee is sponsoring a Christmas Toy Drive for children in Kumamoto, Kyushu (Japan's south island).

Gifts are sent to Pastor Nathan Bowman who serves an international congregation and has a ministry of providing toys to some 800 orphans in 15 institutions in Kumamoto at Christmas. Children's basic needs are provided by the government but the gifts provided by the toy drive are likely the only things they can call their own.

Last year the DHLC Global Mission Committee packaged and funded the postage to send two boxes of toys and clothing for the orphans. Pastor Bowman expressed much gratitude and appreciation for our generous and thoughtful gifts. Although gifts may be purchased, the handcrafted wooden toys and jewelry and hand-sewn pillowcase dresses were an inspiration to the teachers and elders who saw and heard about them. Of course the kids loved them!

If you would like to participate in this year's Christmas Toy Drive, here are some suggestions:

The children range in age from birth to age 18. They read little or no English (as in instructions). Clothing should be cotton (or mostly cotton blend) as Kyushu is a tropical climate. Nothing containing leather can be sent. Also, postage is expensive, so selecting light weight or small items is suggested. There will be a labeled collection box in the entrance hall of the church for items that will be collected until Sunday, December 1.

- Wooden toys and games
- Toy cars, planes, etc.
- Art supplies (nothing liquid)
- Dolls (not stuffed animals)
- Sharing games, puzzles and sports equipment
- Cotton clothing and accessories
- Contemporary Christian Music CD's
- Sheet music for piano, violin, flute, guitar, and percussion.

(English words for these contemporary songs would be important. Music similar to Steven Curtis Chapman and Casting Crowns has been requested.)
